2021 November

3 Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the Lord under Eli. The word of the Lord was rare in those days; visions were not widespread. ² At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; 3 the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the Lord, where the ark of God was. 4 Then the Lord called, "Samuel! Samuel!" and he said, "Here I am!" 5 and ran to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call; lie down again." So he went and lay down. 6 The Lord called again, "Samuel!" Samuel got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call, my son; lie down again." 7 Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord, and the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. 8 The Lord called Samuel again, a third time. And he got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." Then Eli perceived that the Lord was calling the boy. 9 Therefore Eli said to Samuel, "Go, lie down; and if he calls you, you shall say, 'Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening." So Samuel went and lay down in his place. 10 Now the Lord came and stood there, calling as before, "Samuel! Samuel!" And Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening." 1 Samuel 3:1-10

I don't know if you've ever looked at this call of Samuel as a call of Eli too. I hadn't either until the Heritage District virtual gathering on October 18 when the Rev. Dr. Jennie Brown, Assistant to the Bishop and Director of Clergy Excellence, opened my eyes. She talked about Eli having served as priest for a long time.

She talked about how Eli's children didn't want to take over his position and how sad that made him feel. She talked about how Eli thought Hannah was drunk all the while she prayed to God for a son and promised God that she would give her son back to God when he was of age. Then we see this scene, which most of the time is referred to as Samuel's call...but what if it was Eli's call too.

It says that Eli's eyesight had begun to grow dim. This could literally mean he was losing his sight, but it could also be pointing out that he wasn't hearing from God very much anymore. I wonder if Eli felt a bit useless, not being able to serve God like he always had. But it says, "the lamp of God had not yet gone out." Eli still had a purpose and a reason to continue serving God.

Then there's all the back and forth of Samuel coming to Eli thinking it was Eli calling him, but it was really God. Finally, "Eli perceived that the Lord was calling the boy." I wonder if in that moment Eli recalled all the conversations he had had with his own sons to no avail about being faithful to God. I wonder if he contemplated telling Samuel to go back to sleep and to not bother him again. But that's not what Eli does. He supports Samuel in his call and tells him what to do to answer God. Eli knew his time was almost up, but he wanted there to be people of faith to follow after him. His own family had abandoned the faith he'd always know, but Eli was still willing to keep the faith going by supporting this new servant of God. Eli had no idea how God would use Samuel, but Eli trusted God and gave the outcome to God.

Do you feel like Eli? Have you been frustrated that you can no longer do all that you use to do in the service of God? Do you find yourself frustrated with the younger generation always coming and saying, "Here I am, you called me" and then witnessing them doing what you have always done in totally new and different ways? What do you think helped Eli to let go of the outcome and to trust God with who God was calling to continue the ministry? Who, in your sphere of influence, are you hearing the call to support? What does that support look like and what are your next steps?

I have witnessed the struggle between the younger and older generations at BFUMC. Both have stopped listening to the other. Perhaps it's time to reread this story of an old priest and a young boy and how God continues to call both.
